

LUNCH

Participants who registered for lunch in Exeter will have lunches in the Main Hall of Exeter College.

Other good places for lunch (or dinner) are

- Covered Market, near Exeter college: Brown's, Café Morton, Brothers, Sofi de France, Ricardo's Coffee Bar, Sandwich Shop, The Oxford Sandwich Company, Alpha Bar (vegetarian);
- there are several restaurants in Little Clarendon Street (near the Mathematical Institute): La Strada, Al-Andalus Tapas Bar, Pierre Victoire, Café Rouge.

If you like ice-cream it's worth walking up here to George and Davis (known as G& D) Ice Cream Café. Try the Oxford Blue.

- The High: several cafes and restaurants are situated on The High Street: Queen's Lane Coffee, Grand Café (which claims to be on the site of England's first coffee house), etc.
- there are lots of restaurants on Walton Street (Jericho area).

OTHER RESTAURANTS FOR DINNER (OR LUNCH)

Other (fancier) restaurants not far from the conference place:

- Quod Restaurant and Bar, 92-94 High Street;
- Lebanese: Al Shami, 25 Walton Crescent;
- Thai: Bangkok House, 42a Hythe Bridge Street / Chiang Mai Kitchen, 130a High Street, Kemp Hall Passage;
- Italian: Jamie's Italian, 24-26 George Street (Jamie Oliver recipes) / Branca, 111 Walton Street;
- Indian: The Bombay, 82 Walton Street / Café Zouk, 135 High Street;
- French: Brasserie Blanc: 71-72 Walton Street (the owner is Raymond Blanc, the famous "chef" of "Le Manoir aux Quat'Saisons" in Great Milton);
- British: Cherwell Boathouse, 50 Bardwell Road / The Old Parsonage Hotel, 1 Banbury Road.

HISTORICAL PUBS

- White Horse, Broad Street, in front of Exeter College.

- The Lamb and Flag, St. Giles. It is believed that Thomas Hardy wrote much of his novel “Jude the Obscure” in this pub. The “Jude the Obscure” pub is at 54 Walton Street.
- The Eagle and the Child, St. Giles. It is where C.S. Lewis and J.R.R. Tolkien used to meet.
- The Bear, Alfred Street. It has tiny bars, one of which has an extraordinary collection of snapped-off ties.
- The Turf Tavern, Bath Place. The Turf Tavern is tucked between Holywell Street and New College Lane. There’s a fine range of well-kept beer.
